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COURSE DESCRIPTION:

In this course, students will explore and experiment with visual and media art design and production within a critical framework. Students will learn to employ technology and techniques safely, creatively, and ethically in a manner that respects all members of a collaborative creative group and society. Effective project management skills will be implemented to work through stages of the creative process as students produce work using tools while considering conceptual, ethical, and aesthetic decisions.

An interdependence between media theory and practice will be explored through co-enrollment in VMA Foundations – Media Studies.

STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- Explore the range of options and processes for creating visual and media-based work.
- Develop a knowledge of best practices and technologies to be utilized in the making of creative work.
- Select creative tools and processes driven by the communication of ideas and concepts.
- Conceptualize, propose, and execute a creative vision as an individual.
- Consider the ethical questions, structural power imbalances, and hegemonic cultural values involved in making and interpreting creative work.
- Consider issues of sustainability and ways to conduct creative work using green production strategies.

It is expected that all assignments will be handed in on time. For each day an assignment is late, five points will be deducted from your grade for that assignment.

Assignments will be graded on the basis of creativity, technical proficiency, and the application of theoretical concepts covered in class.

Attendance and Participation

Attendance is required and will be part of your grade. You should plan to be present in class, participate in activities, and invest yourself in this course. More than three absences will result in the lowering of your final grade.

Journal

Students will maintain a journal for this course as way to organize their work, thoughts, and ideas. Written assignments (reflections, learning statements, etc.) will be posted in journals, as well as links/embeds of all final versions of exercises and projects. Further information about creating journals will be shared during class.

^{*}Procedures for borrowing equipment from the EDC and securing location permits will be covered in detail during a class period early in the semester.

Exercises

During the first half of the semester, students will familiarize themselves with the use of equipment and apply concepts covered in class by completing a series of weekly production exercises. These exercises will start out as in-class work and will typically be finished over weekends as homework. Exercises are meant to prepare students for work on larger projects assigned later in the course.

Projects

Four larger projects will be completed over the second half of the course. Each project will require students to engage in a different type of media-making: fiction, documentary, experimental, and interactive.

Midterm Exam

An in-class, closed-book midterm exam will be given during <u>week eight</u> of the semester. It will consist of approximately fifty multiple-choice, fill in the blank, matching, and short answer questions. This exam is given to ensure that students fully understand the concepts covered during the first half of the semester so they may be applied to projects completed during the second half of the course. All material on the exam will be covered in class.

There will be no final exam.
